1. Flashlight - Always have a flashlight equipped with batteries. This should be kept in the glove compartment so it is readily available. You should change the batteries on these every year when you change the batteries in your home smoke detectors.
2. Fully Stocked First Aid Kit – This is an essential item in every car. Also, know how to use the contents before you need to use them.
3. Cell Phone with Emergency Charger – Have all of your critical numbers preprogrammed into the phone.
4. Snacks and bottled water. In winter months, it is wise to carry other goods to keep you warm and safe if you run into trouble.
5. Maps or a GPS – It very easy to get lost and having maps of where you are at and going will be very beneficial in case you do get lost.
6. Basic Tool Set – A small set which includes items like screwdrivers, wrenches, pliers, a hammer and the like will be very helpful in dealing with a minor vehicle issue.
7. Jack, Spare Tire, and a Tire Inflator (this is a unit that can be plugged into the vehicles auxiliary power jacks that can be used to pump up your tires).
8. Jumper Cables & a Towing Strap. Many times other people are willing to help you out, especially if you are traveling with young children, but they may not be carrying these sorts of goods.
9. Fire Extinguisher – These should be easily accessible.
10. Flares – These will help you let others know you need help.

Louie also recommends that you join an automobile club such as American Automobile Association that can help you out in an emergency.

As Louie says, "A little up-front preparation can make everyone's travels all the better."
